Primary Elections March 2, 2010

This Voters Guide lists local candidates who appear on the ballot in the March 2, 2010 Primary Election and includes responses to a questionnaire sent to those candidates in the contested races. Candidates were asked to limit responses to each question to 100 words in length. The last sentence(s) of the response may have been omitted or edited for purposes of length. Otherwise, responses are printed as submitted. Races are listed in the order they will appear on the primary ballots.

The League of Women Voters (LWV) is a nonpartisan organization that works to promote political responsibility through informed participation of all citizens in their government. The League does not support or oppose any political party or any candidate. The League does publish and distribute factual information to help prepare citizens to cast an informed vote and does take action on selected governmental issues that it has studied. You may bring this *Voters Guide* into the voting booth.

Please note that candidates are labeled in this *Voters Guide* as: Democrat (D) or Republican (R). The races and names of candidates are listed in ballot order.

Candidates listed as uncontested are unopposed within their party in the Primary Election, March 2, 2010.

<p>Bert Cobb (R)</p> <p>I'm not a career politician- I am a physician who is concerned about the future of our community. I served as chief of surgery at Central Texas Medical Center and have operated three area medical clinics. I also served as president of the Tri-County Medical Society and helped to found the Rotary Club of Greater San Marcos. My education includes a B.S. from Texas A&M and M.D. from the University of Texas Medical School. I am a certified handgun and personal protection instructor for the NRA, retired Major, U.S. Air Force, and certified Master Gardener and Master Naturalist.</p>	<p>I know that your money belongs to <i>you</i> and not the government. As county judge, I will restore fiscal discipline to county government and put an end to the cycle of property tax increases. As a growing county, we must do a better job prioritizing what really matters to Hays County families. Every dollar wasted on pet projects and inefficiencies is a dollar that should have gone to improving our roads and meeting growing demands on our water supply and emergency services. I will reset the priorities of county government and fight for fiscal discipline while meeting our growing needs.</p>	<p>1. Restore fiscal discipline to county government. Now is the time for county government to tighten its belt and weather the recession without raising taxes. 2. Improve the safety and efficiency of our roads and meet growing demands on our water supply and emergency services. This calls for the right priorities, decisive action, and fiscal responsibility. 3. Create higher paying local jobs by attracting quality employers to Hays County. 4. My business background includes employment with real estate attorneys, managing three public water supply companies, building two successful RV Parks, the latter being Plum Creek Campground built 12 years ago and holding a real estate broker's license. My education as a planner and experience as a developer and business owner is a perfect combination for making commonsense decisions affecting growth. I have a clear understanding of complex financial or legal instruments through years of experience, coursework and interaction with State Commissions.</p>	<p>We must demonstrate an ethical use of public funds - beginning with a decrease to the Judge's salary by \$20,000 in response to the FY09 salary increase voted for by the court and eliminating expenditures for programs outside the scope of County responsibility.</p>	<p>1. Solving the water issues, not just in the northern part of the county but for the entire county. 2. Improving roads between communities and transportation congestion for commuters. 3. Creating an integrated Emergency Response facility, promoting teamwork between response units and facilitating workshops between elected officials and departments for better understanding and communication. 4. Attracting industry and commerce to Hays County to help our residents maintain employment but also to foster good stewardship of environmental resources by keeping the workforce closer to home and minimizing the individual carbon footprint increased by longer commutes to work.</p>

<p>Elizabeth “Liz” Sumter (D)</p> <p>I have a Bachelors Degree in Liberal Arts, a Masters Degree in Public Administration and additional education and training in technology education. Prior to the formation of my own companies – Sumter's Services and Fortress Builders – I held various positions with the Defense Department and the City of Austin. The Treasurer’s Office of the State of Texas and a contract position with the United States Energy Department in Egypt through the International Institute of Education as a consultant to executive level managers on human resource, management and information technology issues.</p>	<p>I have made numerous changes to the county budget already. The next step is to implement performance evaluation tools. I have provided training for department heads in goal and objective development in regards to budgeting but evaluation of those goals and objectives have yet to be implemented. I would also reduce the reliance on sales tax for services and use those revenues primarily for one-time capital expenditures. Sales taxes revenues tend to be more unpredictable and do not lend themselves to a consistent revenue stream.</p>	<p>Moving forward with infrastructure (roads, government center, parks, habitat conservation, jail) without breaking the backs of taxpayers and reducing services during difficult economic times. Finishing the County Strategic Policy Plan and implementing its various components – especially forming partnerships to better effectively spend tax dollars together. Continuing to enlist citizens to assist in guiding county government policies - water and wastewater, economic development, parks and open space, etc. Continue to provide for open and transparent government. The entire Commissioners Court agenda packet and the invoices are on-line for citizens to access before the Court makes a decision on those items.</p>
<p>Jeff Barton (D)</p> <p>Grew up in a family that championed civil rights in San Marcos; after college, worked for legendary Democratic congressman Jake Pickle in D.C. Came back to run successful local businesses in northern Hays County and San Marcos; later became manager and shareholder at small national engineering firm, where I represented Fortune 500 companies on multi-million dollar projects, championed “new urbanism” and advised county governments across Texas on environmental policy and growth management; served as county commissioner in the 1990s and again since 2006 with focus on creating jobs, managing growth, and protecting our water and our county’s unique character.</p>	<p>I would prepare the budget with more balance, broader input, less sense of crisis, and more proaction versus reaction. The county budget is no place to further political feuds. There is no excuse, for instance, to submit a budget that would have cut San Marcos EMS funding by 29 percent or Buda library funding by 32 percent while adding new pet projects and fully funding other non-essential programs.</p>	<p>1. Creating and attracting good paying jobs of the future like Grifols in San Marcos, Seton Medical Center in Kyle, and US Foods in Buda - all projects I supported. 2. Managing growth by planning today for the water, roads, rail, and law enforcement needs of tomorrow. 3. Preserving our natural resources – our unique rivers and streams, the beautiful Texas Hill Country, and the black-land prairie. 4. Building bridges to heal the divisive “old politics” now in play and using my experience and temperament to provide leadership for county government and the broader community.</p>

List your experience, education, and training that qualify you for this position.	How would you change the budget for the court?	What is your philosophy of rehabilitation versus punishment?
<p>David A. Mendoza (D)</p> <p>David Mendoza, a Texas Veteran, graduated from S.W.T. in 1996. Prior to attending St. Mary's University School of Law, David gained valuable experience working in the legal departments of the Securities Board, Attorney General, and Bexar County D.A.. He also instructed at the School of Law and Texas State University. As an Assistant D.A. in Hays County, Mr. Mendoza now instructs cadets at the Sheriff's Academy and has litigated drug/bond forfeitures, criminal prosecutions, juveniles, expunctions/non-disclosures, mental commitments, open records, appeals/post-convictions, CPS cases, and general litigation. David holds licenses in Texas, U.S. District Court, Appellate Court, and the Supreme Court.</p>	<p>The total budget for salaries in County Court No. 1 and 2 in FY 2010 is approximately \$612,000. The operating budget for both courts is under the budget for County Court No. 2, and is approximately \$284,000. Budgets are set by the Commissioner's Court and changed only under emergency circumstances. The budget for FY 2010 has been approved. For Fiscal year 2011, I would recommend reducing the budget by an amount that can be absorbed during the transition to the new courthouse, if any.</p>	<p>To administer fair and equitable rulings, we must first understand that each case should be evaluated on its own merits or mitigating circumstances. For instance, if Butch steals to get money for drugs, an appropriate ruling may be restitution and a fine (punishment) plus a drug addiction class (rehabilitation). If Butch never steals again, was he deterred by the punishment or was he rehabilitated? This is an age old question. Whereas Butch gets some rehabilitation, a habitual (repeat) adult offender may get only punishment. Conversely, a first-time juvenile misdemeanor may get only rehabilitation. Common sense is key.</p>
<p>Anna M. Boling (D)</p> <p>I am the Judge of the Hays County Court at Law No. 1, appointed by Hays County Commissioners Court in August 2009 out of a field of 7 applicants. My over 15 years of legal experience, training as a Mediator, and years of volunteerism in the community have prepared me to serve all citizens of Hays County. I have formal and informal judicial training and have presided over hundreds of cases. I have the diversity of experience necessary to be a good judge and I respectfully ask that I be given the opportunity to continue as your Judge.</p>	<p>As judges, we are always aware that we have a budget to manage. Believe it or not, we have a very sparse budget. We avail ourselves of criminal justice grants to supplement our budget and, if anything, I would look for ways to secure additional funding for things like updating equipment. Our staff is capped at a minimal level and we do not expect additional hires with the exception of a second court reporter. We have been denied funding for a second court reporter in the past but will continue to request funding for that position.</p>	<p>This court deals with misdemeanor criminal cases, juvenile cases, and a myriad of civil matters. As Judge, I work with probation officers to provide rehabilitative services to individuals, depending on the type of case and whether the individual has a prior criminal history. All cases are reviewed on a case by case basis and there are laws in place to deal with punishment of repeat offenders. Protection of society is uppermost in our minds so if rehabilitation has been attempted in the past and failed, we will take more severe measures including, but not limited to, incarceration.</p>

Bill Huddleston has maintained his administrative and managerial skill sets.</p>	<p>Listen, communicate, reason, negotiate and cooperate. There are many dedicated people involved in providing of emergency services to the citizens of Hays County. We all care, and want the best for the citizens we serve. We all have something to contribute. We must all be brought to the table, all be heard, to provide a unified and efficient service. Working together we can be the best.</p>	<p>Fixed costs are reasonably predictable. The condition of our jail, and the continued maintenance of that facility must be budgeted for until a new jail is built. No account for it's deteriorated conditions was taken in the last regular budget. It may take years to have a new jail on line. In the present economic conditions of our country we must take a deep breath and take a conservative posture. Training and technology provide service and economy that are recognized quickly.</p>
<p>Tommy Ratliff (D)</p> <p>In 1975 I graduated from Texas State University with a Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Business. I was accepted to the D.P.S Academy in 1975. I spent 12 years as a State Trooper and 21 years as a Texas Ranger. I retired with 33 years of combined experience involving traffic and criminal law. I have a very good understanding of the investigative process, judicial system, and leadership skills. I currently manage just under 300 employees at the Sheriffs Office and oversee a multi-million dollar budget.</p>	<p>Planning, training and communications. Plan for as many scenarios of emergencies and disasters that are likely to impact Hays County i.e. Weather, Rail and I 35 incidents, Texas State and local schools security, airport and hospital over load. Train for these types of events with all 1st responders in the county. Establish a chain of communications using existing technology and take advantage of new technology and the training that is offered by the numerous agencies that is being funded by TSA, FBI, Federal Railroad Administration and FAA.</p>	<p>My budgetary concerns are for the entire Sheriffs Office, which include adequate salary for many employees, the equipment and tools necessary to professionally serve the citizens of Hays County, while being mindful of the cost to our tax payers.</p>

<p>Mark Jones (R)</p> <p>As a two-term trustee and vice president of the Hays CISD School Board, I am responsible for leading one of our county's largest employers and managing a budget in excess of \$100 million. With foresight and fiscal discipline, I prepared for growth by opening four new schools and fixing overcrowding in our classrooms <i>without raising the tax rate</i>. I have also served on the board of directors of the Plum Creek regional water district and was founding treasurer of Central Texas Life Care, a non-profit crisis pregnancy center located in Hays County.</p>	<p>I support regional planning and quick action to meet our growing transportation needs. Long-term planning is a critical part of our transportation future, but plans alone will not get us moving again. We must work quickly to move Hays County ahead of the growth curve before we find ourselves enmeshed in chronic traffic congestion. This requires working together with local cities and neighborhoods to identify problem traffic areas, concentrating resources on fixing traffic problems in a timely manner, and pushing the regional transportation planning process forward into tangible results.</p>	<p>There are many resources in our community for those in need of quality health care. During this time of recession, we should focus on getting the most out of these existing resources rather than spending additional tax dollars or creating new services. I would support partnering with charities, churches, and civic organizations to better inform our neighbors in need about how our community can offer them a helping hand through both public and private services. I would also support an initiative to better match citizens in need with the state and federal programs in which they are eligible to participate.</p>

We must continue to work and attract additional quality health providers. However, more local health care facilities is not enough. Hays County has a responsibility to ensure that those in greatest need have access to medical treatment by the effective awareness and administration of the various federal and state programs providing such assistance.</p>

You may apply for a ballot by mail if you:

1. will be away from Hays County on Election Day and during early voting;
2. are disabled;
3. are 65 years of age or older on Election Day; or
4. are confined in jail.

Assistance with Voting: All polling locations are handicapped accessible. The new eSlate voting system is fully accessible and has an audio feature which allows any voter to listen to the ballot. You are also entitled to receive assistance if you cannot read or write, or have a physical disability that prevents you from reading or marking the ballot.

Tell the election official that you need help to vote. You do not have to provide proof of your disability. You MAY be assisted by any person of your choice, OR one election worker during early voting, OR two election workers on Election Day. You may NOT be assisted by your employer, OR an agent of your employer, OR an officer or agent of your union.

The person assisting you must read you the entire ballot, unless you ask to have only parts of the ballot read. The person assisting you must take an oath that he or she will not try to influence your vote and will mark your ballot as you direct. If you choose to be assisted by polling place officials, a poll watcher and/or state election inspector present in the polling place may observe the voting process to be sure that the ballot has been marked as you wanted. If you ask to be assisted by a person of your choosing, no one else may watch you vote.

Interpreters at the polls: If you cannot speak English, or communicate only with sign language, you may use an interpreter to help you communicate with election officials. You may select any registered voter of your county to be your interpreter. If you cannot read the ballot, your interpreter may translate the ballot for you in the voting booth, after taking the Assistant Oath.
